This partnership is designed to improve patient care, shorten hospital stays and reduce costs.

The program was coordinated in Lubbock by the Texas Tech Office of Rural and Community Health.



IMPACT Exposes Students to Health Professionals

One-hundred and eighty 4th and 5th grade students were enrolled in the IMPACT (Investigating Medical Professions and Career Tracks) Program - a partnership between Texas Tech HSC El Paso and the El Paso Independent School District. The students learned about healthcare careers and developed an awareness of medicine's contributions to society.

The half-day, four-times-a-week program also focused on health systems of the body. The majority of IMPACT sessions included classroom work with 18 teachers engaged by EPISD. Texas Tech HSC El Paso physicians and Thomason healthcare professionals visited these students at Cordova Middle School, where classes were located.

They spared no test or exam to determine the cause of my pain. These tests and exams were inconclusive, yet they continued to analyze and study the symptoms at length.

"From the registration at ER, Dr. Aragon and Dr. Pardo assured that there was no delay in my care. Other physicians who supported these doctors and assured I was not neglected were, Dr. Manisha Gupta, Dr. Manuel Borrego, Dr. Jary Pando, Dr. Guadalupe Orozco. There were many other excellent doctors that had a hand in my care, offered help or saw to my every need with compassion and humor. They made me feel like family.

"As it turned out, I had a perforated appendix. I am forever grateful for the relentless pursuit followed up by Dr. Noriega and his team to admit me to the surgical ward. There the first symptoms seemed to indicate it was where I needed to be. They were not wrong. From then on, it was clockwork: inform, examine, test, analyze, consult and make a decision! Pre-surgery care was outstanding and the surgery was trouble-free and efficient. Post-surgery was a continuation of their concern and care until the decision to send me home. No one faltered. I was at all times in great hands.

"I commend all the Texas Tech Family Practice doctors and their support teams for a job exceptionally well done. They exemplify the truest sense of what family practice should be," said Mendoza.

Ting Honored for Helping Homeless

Stanislaus Ting, M.D., Texas Tech HSC El Paso immunologist/allergist, was recently honored by the New Mexico Medical Society for sharing his gifts with the homeless.

After moving to Las Cruces, New Mexico in 1986 and noticing the vast discrepancies in health care between those with and without insurance, Dr. Ting started discussions with local community leaders to do something about it. In 1990, Dr. Ting opened St. Luke's Health Care Mission in St. Andrew's Episcopal Church to provide healthcare for the homeless.

The clinic, which moved to a new location in 1999, is staffed by volunteer medical personnel, and sees nearly 12,000 patients a year. Dr. Ting, who also volunteers his time, serves as the clinic's president and medical director. He also maintains a busy private practice and teaches at Texas Tech HSC El Paso.
