Pedi Residents Win Awards from Texas Pediatric Society

The Department of Pediatrics is proud to announce that two pediatric residents received awards in the Texas Pediatric Society electronic poster competition. In the section for hypothesis-driven project, Oscar Ingaramo, M.D., a thirdyear resident, and Marie Leiner, Ph.D., research assistant professor, were recognized with an honorable mention for their research on the impact of the healthcare environment on the effectiveness of educational videotapes. Dr. Ingaramo is also one of the pediatric chief residents.

Bibiana Restrepo, M.D., is the only winner in the section for literature review and received honorable mention for her evidence-based guideline on screening magnetic resonance imaging in autism spectrum disorders. She also received the Department of Pediatrics' Resident of the Year Award in the category for firstyear resident for the academic year 2005-2006. The winners will be recognized at the 2006 Annual Meeting of the Texas Pediatric Society in Dallas in September.

Electrical Fires Most Common in Healthcare

Electrical fires are the most common fires in healthcare. To help prevent them, follow these guidelines:

* Make sure that only UL-rated electrical equipment is used.

* Make sure that electrical equipment and motors are kept clean and properly maintained.

* Report old or worn wiring and broken or damaged fittings on equipment to the appropriate person.

* Never overburden electrical outlets by creating an "octopus."

* Do not use extension cords that exceed six feet. They should never be run under carpeting or be tacked to a wall.

* Immediately investigate any strange or unusual smell coming from a piece of electrical equipment. A strange odor is often the first warning of fire. Stop using that piece of equipment until it is checked out. (Source: Coastal Health Train, 2006)



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
