**9.27** French Community Holiday - a holiday held only in the French Community of Belgium. The date of the holiday is the anniversary of the victory of the Belgian Revolution in 1830

9.28	<b>Meskel (Finding of the True Cross)</b> - commemorates the finding of the True Cross, the cross (meskel) on which Jesus Christ was crucified. According to legend, the cross was found in the fourth century by Queen Helena, mother of the Roman emperor, Constantine; celebrations begin with gathering of yellow flowers and tying them with branches; on the eve before the feast of the Meskel, flowers are lit in a spectacular bonfire	Ethiopian Orthodox Christian
	<b>Navaratri Commences</b> – a nine night's festival, celebrated in the honor of Durga (Warrior Goddess), Lakshmi (Goddess of Wealth and Prosperity), and Saraswati (Goddess of Knowledge)	Hindu
	<b>Teacher's Day</b> - celebrated on Confucius' birthday; Confucius was a Chinese thinker and social philosopher, whose teachings and philosophy have been deeply influential; his philosophy emphasized personal and governmental morality, correctness of social relationships, justice and sincerity	Taiwan
	<b>Confucius' Birthday</b> - commemorates the birth in 551 BCE of the teacher Confucius, who was perhaps one of the most influential men in Chinese history; he stressed five virtues: charity, justice, propriety, wisdom, and loyalty	China, Taiwan
	<b>Referendum Day</b> - anniversary of the day in 1958 when there was a public vote for independence	Guinea
	<b>Day of Czech Statehood</b> - commemorates the day on which the Czech Prince Wenceslas of the Přemyslid dynasty, was murdered by his treacherous brother Boleslav in a ruthless bid for power; held on St. Wenceslas Day, the day of the patron saint of the Czech lands;	Czech Republic
	<b>Rosh Hashanah</b> (New Year) – a time to remember the creation of the world; also called Feast of the Trumpets	Judaism*

9.29	<b>Manman Aloumandia</b> – a Voodoo holiday	Haiti
	<b>Michaelmas</b> – the feast day for St. Michael the Archangel	

9.30	<b>Agricultural Reform Day</b> - a day to celebrate the importance agriculture plays in the lives of residents of Sao Tome & Principe; the dominate crop is cocoa, representing approximately 95% of exports; other export crops include copra, palm kernels, and coffee	São Tomé e Príncipe
	<b>Manit Day</b> - an annual celebration that honors local culture, cultural values, and customs; observed the last Friday in September	Marshall Islands*
