Geronimo and the Apache Resistance

In 1886, the US government mobilized 5,000 men—nearly one-quarter of the entire US Army—to capture Geronimo, the Apache leader, and his band of 39 followers who had for decades resisted the advance of pioneers and other threats to their traditional way of life, fighting attempts by the federal government to confine them to reservations. By this time, Geronimo had become one of the most famous, feared, and misunderstood Indian warriors. This *American Experience* film is a search to separate Geronimo from the myth that surrounds him; a search for an understanding of the people who once ruled much of the American Southwest and of those with whom they came into conflict with. It is the story of a tragic collision of two civilizations, each with dramatically different views of the world and startlingly different views of each other.
