



Sticker Shock from an Article Publication Charge (APC)

A faculty member with a grant from the National Institutes of Health (NIH) goes to publish an article about their research findings. Because the faculty member has read the NIH Statement entitled: "Accelerating Access to Research Results: New Implementation Date for the 2024 NIH Public Access Policy, ¹" they know that starting on **July 1**, **2025**, they must immediately make their article publicly available through the National Library of Medicine's PubMed Central to comply. They also know that not following the NIH guidelines could jeopardize their ability to get future NIH grants, so they want to ensure their article is published as a "gold open access article." In open access publishing, colors are used to differentiate between different types of open access article services. Green open access articles require the author to self-archive a pre-print of their article on the web and submit the article to PubMed Central, then themselves to make the article immediately available on the Internet. Since the faculty members see this as too much work, they do not want this publishing arrangement. With a gold open-access article, the publisher makes the article immediately accessible to anyone on the Internet, and the publisher submits the article to PubMed Central for the author. Because gold open access meets all the NIH requirements and does not require any extra work on the author's part, this is the publishing arrangement the faculty member is looking for.

The faculty member has previously published articles in the *Nature Medicine* journal and wants to publish their newest article in the same journal. *Nature Medicine*, ISSN 1546-170X, is a prestigious Springer Nature journal (99th percentile) with an Impact Factor of 50 and a CiteScore of 82.4, making publishing in this journal very desirable. However, when the faculty member goes to the journal's website³, they find out that the publisher has just raised their APC, article publication fee, for gold open access to \$12,690. The faculty member is shocked that the price to publish a single article in this journal has increased so quickly⁴, and the faculty member does not have the funds to pay for this higher fee. As a result, the faculty member must spend a lot of time locating a lower-status journal with a more reasonable APC to publish their research.


