III. DEAN'S REPORT		
Frank Stout, , Associate Dean for Finance and Administration/AVP for Fiscal Affairs	HSU: The measure to make Texas Tech's Health Sciences Center at El Paso a stand-alone university passed Senate thirty (30) to one (1). Several El Paso community leaders were present in support of the measure including Paul L. Foster, Woody Hunt, and Rick Francis. The measure will move to the House Committee within the next two weeks. If the measure receives two thirds of the votes, the school will receive HEAF funds. Drafts of organizational charts, which include operational positions, will be sent out soon but will not become final until approved by the Board of Regents.	
	SARP FUNDS: Mr. Stout addressed the Department of Research's request for extra funds for supplies for SARP students. He confirmed that \$15,000 has been allocated to purchase supplies needed for mentors and their students for lab work.	
	CHAIR OF NEUROLOGY: Dr. Salvador Cruz-Flores will be joining our campus May 1 st as the new chair of Neurology. He is already actively recruiting neurologists.	
	NEW CLINIC AT UNIVERSITY TOWERS: At the request of Diana Natalicio, President of UTEP, a new Family Medicine Clinic will be opened at the University Towers and will serve UTEP faculty and staff but not students.	
	PARKING: Once the parking lot is completed where the current Box Factory stands, there will be 170 available parking spots for faculty and staff. The parking lot will have an entrance and exit that will take people to Paisano Drive. It is a city easement therefore anyone, including the Department of Health employees, can use it. Faculty who work at the MEB and MSB buildings will be parking in lots adjacent to these buildings.	
	BUDGET: Department budget processes are underway and most departments have been notified and received the 2 necessary forms (one TTUHSC-based, one PLFSOM-based) while the rest will be notified soon.	

IV. PRESIDENT'S REPORT Rajkumar Lakshmanaswamy, Ph.D. Dr. Raj reported the following: - Faculty Council President GENERAL FACULTY MEETING: A total of 85 faculty members attended the meeting including faculty members from the Northeast and Montwood clinics as well as one faculty member from the San Antonio campus. PLFSOM LEADERSHIP RETREAT: Dr. Lakshmanaswamy attended the meeting earlier this month; this is the first time a faculty member attended the leadership retreat. The leadership team recognized all faculty members and is very supportive of their contributions and accomplishments. Each associate dean presented reports on their specific areas. There were numerous accomplishments announced. Dr. Lakshmanaswamy advised faculty council members to inform their department's faculty members that the leadership acknowledges and appreciates everything they do. V. FACULTY SENATE UPDATE Dale Quest. Ph.D. Dr. Quest reported the following: - Faculty Senator Quorum was not met on the March 1, 2013 meeting to conduct official business, however, Dr. Nick Coppola, Faculty Senate President wanted the senators to remind faculty of the May 25th deadline to submit nominations for the President's Awards. There was also a heads up that the next OP up for review is regarding access to T&P dossiers by candidates. Inconsistencies and lack of clarity to the access of the board dossiers at the different stages of the process have been identified. VI. EPCMS UPDATE Dr. Marwah reported the following: Rajendra Marwah, M.D. - Community Physician This month's meeting was held Tuesday, March 12, 2013 and the meeting was extended to discuss UMC's plan to open new clinics in the El Paso area. James Valenti, CEO of University Medical Center (UMC) was present. UMC CLINICS: The El Paso County Medical Society (EPCMS) expressed their opposition to UMC's request for bonds to open up UMC clinics in the El Paso area and stated that all private physicians are also opposed. EPCMS and physicians were never consulted about the UMC bonds and the clinics. The plan includes opening four large clinics to serve the indigent population. The clinics will be in the most affluent parts of El Paso, staffed with nurse practitioners and

<u>2013 PRE-TENURE AND/OR PROMOTION</u>: This year's process has received very good participation from the clinical departments, medical education, and biomedical sciences. While it is mandatory for Tenure-Track faculty members, Non-Tenure Track faculty members also participate. Deadline to submit the application is April 1st. Each participating

department will establish its own departmental pre-tenure and/or pre-promotion review committee. The process concludes at the end of May 2013.

<u>FACULTY EVALUATIONS</u>: This year, copies of faculty evaluations have been forwarded to the Office of Faculty Affairs. So far, all the departments have done an excellent job in completing and turning in the copies of faculty evaluations. More are expected, as deadlines depend on the size of the each department.

Q&A:

Q: When will the Tenure and Promotion applicants be notified of granted tenure or promotion?

A: All participants received a letter from the dean as well as congratulatory phone calls. The faculty members who did not receive favorable results will also receive a letter from the dean and a plan from the office development to help him/her prepare for his/her future application.

VIII. STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

A. Committee on Graduate Medical Education

- Armando Meza, M.D., Committee Chair

Dr. Meza provided the committee's semi-annual report and discussed the following:

Educational Component

- Core Residencies (10)
 - O The Committee on Graduate Medical Education voted to close the Anesthesiology residency program due to recent issues that have affected the program. There have been issues in the Anesthesiology department of Anesthesiology that have affected the residency program. As of right now, the program is still open and it has initial accreditation. The Committee on GME, formed by program directors, assistant program directors, and some administrators, has decided to close the program. The decision does not necessarily end at that level and there is a process to be followed. The ACGME will decide after a formal proposal is submitted and discussed with the Dean.
- ACGME Approved Fellowships (5)
 - The Nephrology fellowship is fully accredited but will not open until next year. The program director will be leaving and a replacement will be sought.
- Other Fellowships (2) No accreditation available through the ACGME, but approved by another agency.
- Educational Resources Issues

<u>Q&A</u>:

Q: What are the implications of closing the Anesthesiology residency program? There are concerns about being a full-fledged medical school without a residency program in Anesthesiology.

A: The implications are significant such as the possibility that the program will not be opened again.

Q: Will the current residents receive credit if the program closes?

A: If the program closes, the residents will receive credit to the end of the academic cycle in June and they will have to relocate.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS (Continued)

Dr. Hana Teissler, Assistant Professor of Anesthesiology stated that fourteen (14) faculty members have signed up to work the residency and it is known that there were three people sabotaging the program.

Q: Is the committee's decision final?

A: This is the third time the committee has met on this issue and that's why a meeting with the Dean has been scheduled. The Committee on GME, according to ACGME has the final say, however it is not stated that the committee cannot change its mind. Once the committee makes the decision, it must be abided by everyone else.

Q: How was the GME match?

A: We got 100% with the exception of Anesthesia. All positions (67) were filled.
